MEET THE ASO'S NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR!

There will be a new face in the ASO office in Maryland Hall starting Sept. 21. But Patrick J. Nugent won't be new to Maryland -- the new executive director and chief development officer of the Annapolis Symphony Orchestra grew up in Silver Spring and his parents live across the bridge in Cambridge. So, welcome back, Patrick.

Nugent comes to us from Cincinnati, where he was a VP for development and marketing at a nonprofit serving children and families; before that he was director of individual and major giving at the Cincinnati Museum Center. Patrick sees his development (aka fundraising) duties as a major focus of his new job at the ASO. "That is the skill set I bring," he said in a phone interview. Here's his plan for dealing with major donors:

"Within the first month I have to figure out who are the 20 donors whose advice and counsel I most need and meet with them, and during the second month I need to meet with the next 20. The other donors and their opinions are important, too, but those are the ones who will take us the farthest fastest," he said. From the pool of other donors will grow the next class of big givers.




Then, he said, he needs to dig into the ASO's \$1.2 million budget "in all its gory details." One-third of the symphony's budget comes from ticket sales and the rest comes from philanthropic donors and government sources, he said. He believes that the ASO has the capacity to raise \$1 million per year, perhaps within five years.

Patrick and his wife Mary Kay Rehard, a social worker, are at this writing looking for a house in Annapolis. They have three kids, one in graduate school, one in college and one in high school. Avid kayakers and owners of a dinghy, they look forward to boating in our waterways. Back home in Ohio, they are loyal subscribers of the Cincinnati Symphony.

Look for him when you go to an Opening Night Gala. He'll be there both nights, Oct. 2 and 3. He wants to get to know the Friends, so introduce yourself. "It seems to me that the Friends of the Annapolis Symphony are an absolutely key constituency," Nugent said. "I would like to work very closely with the Friends. If our object is to move our symphony to the next stage of greatness, you all have a role."
